Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

Application-Related Questions

Question: Can our organization apply for both projects listed in the RFP?

Answer: Yes, an organization can apply for both projects. If choosing to apply for both projects, a bidder must submit separately for each project but can reuse the Capability Statement and JEDI Capability Statement.

Question: How will our organization be scored if we apply for both projects?

Answer: An organization will receive a score out of 60 possible points for each project. See the evaluation criteria table in the RFP for a breakdown of the points.

Question: If our organization submits for both projects, can we be awarded just one contract or is it all or nothing?

Answer: The score out of 60 possible points will be ranked to other organizations submitting for the same project. Therefore, it is possible that an organization may apply to both projects and only be awarded a contract for one project.

Deliverables-Related Questions

Question: What is the budget for these projects?

Answer: Both projects are budgeted fairly to meet the expected deliverables. NACHC is looking for a bid with a reasonable proposed budget that captures the anticipated cost of quality completion of expected deliverables while considering market standards and NACHC's not-for-profit status.

Question: What is the expectation for project 1 when it says toolkit/microsite?

Answer: NACHC is open to proposals with the deliverables packaged in either form. Your subject matter expertise and experience will be consulted to format the deliverables in an effective delivery method.

Question: Is NACHC open to modifications such as the components of the toolkit/microsite or production of multiple Coalition reports tailored to different audiences?

Answer: NACHC is open to the expertise, experience, and recommendations of the bidder at the time of proposal, after initial current state analysis is complete, and/or at major milestone checkpoints of the project. For example, if a review of the field finds very few health centers utilize social media to recruit staff, then NACHC is open to discussion with the bidder around the deliverable of social media templates in the toolkit/microsite.

Question: Does NACHC have reports to provide for the review of current state (a deliverable included in both project 1 and project 2)?

Answer: NACHC may have previously published resources that an organization will find useful in the review of current state; however, with changes during COVID-19 and other rapidly evolving conditions of the healthcare field, some information may now be outdated. NACHC anticipates that a bidder will conduct a review and analysis of the current state in the field.
