<p><b>3:30pm - 5:00pm</b></p>	<p style="text-align: center;"><b>Policy and Advocacy #1A – Atlantic 1-2</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b><u>Lessons Learned from Massachusetts’ Flexible Services Program: Addressing Health Related Social Needs through Health Center Community Organization Partnerships</u></b></p> <p><i>The Massachusetts Medicaid Flexible Services program is an innovative demonstration project addressing social drivers of health for patients with complex health needs. Through a Medicaid 1115 waiver, this \$149 million investment is designed to improve health outcomes and reduce total cost of care.</i></p> <p><i>The session will highlight the lessons learned from the state’s largest Flexible Services program, led by Community Care Cooperative (C3) - a health-center based Accountable Care Organization. On behalf of their network of Community Health Centers, C3 has partnered with twenty-one community-based organizations to address food insecurity and housing instability for nearly 10,000 Medicaid patients. Their health center-CBO model has been highly successful, with 91% of patients successfully connecting to services. Early program data demonstrates improvement in food and nutrition security, housing stability, diabetes control, and a decrease in ED visits and health care costs.</i></p> <p><i>Panelists will share insights about program planning, implementation, partnership data sharing and evaluation. The session will also highlight workflows at 19 FQHCs to leverage health related social needs screening and closed-loop program referrals in order to improve patient engagement and quality of care while supporting households’ food insecurity housing instability and health needs.</i></p> <p><i>Finally, our speakers will share recommendations on ways in which this program model can be adapted to other state Medicaid programs and funding streams such as grant-funded programs and health care community benefit programs, providing specific take-aways and advice for conference attendees looking to replicate this model. One of these programs, the National Health Service Corps (NHSC), has a field strength of over 20,000 clinicians, with over 60% serving in health centers. *tables from reporting aggregate data at the health center level to disaggregated data at the patient level. UDS Patient-Level Submission (UDS+) implementation will begin with the 2023 UDS reports that health centers will submit by February 15, 2024. Patient-level data will better support health centers to identify and analyze important factors that influence care-seeking behavior, quality of care, and health outcomes.*

*This session will provide an overview of UDS+ and suggest ways that PCA, HCCN, and NTTAPs will be able to use this data to gain insights that are fundamental to improving care delivery, achieving health equity, and can significantly impact treatment outcomes, particularly for underserved and vulnerable populations.*

**Helping Health Centers Reach 80% Blood Pressure Control: New Evidence, Strategies, and Tools for PCAs and HCCNs**

*Tired of flat returns in hypertension management? This session will focus on specific evidence-based strategies PCAs and HCCNs can offer training on and disseminate to their health centers that will yield 80% blood pressure control. We will also introduce key tools to assist in using these strategies, including NACHC’s Improving Blood Pressure Control in African American’s Roadmap, the AMA’s Hypertension Treatment Protocol, NACHC’s suite of treatment intensification measures, and a new tool co-developed by CDC, NACHC, the FDA, Mercy Care, Near North, and OCHIN that summarizes preferred Fixed-dose Combination Anti-Hypertensive Medications by state. Finally, we’ll have an interactive panel featuring two of our current Million Hearts HCCNs as well as one of our Clinical Advisors to share practical approaches and lessons learned in using these strategies and tools to achieve substantial improvements in hypertension outcomes.*

To that end, and in support of the Federal Government’s Open Data requirements, the Bureau of Health Workforce has re-organized its health workforce data pages on the HRSA Data Warehouse [data.hrsa.gov] and augmented its publicly available data holdings. These resources are aimed at helping stakeholders – including the Primary Care Associations and health centers -- find useful data that can be incorporated into relevant documents such as their workforce plans, community health assessments, and grant applications for BHW training programs.</i></p> <p><i>In this session, participants will learn about recently released data assets. The session will feature a live demonstration of a new Health Workforce Footprint Map which for the first time ever allows users to visualize all of HRSA’s health workforce assets in a single tool. As time allows, other resources, such as the Health Workforce Connector, which Health Centers can utilize to recruit health professionals, and the newly released Program Applicant and Award Dashboards, which can be used to analyze NHSC applications and awards at state and national levels, will be demonstrated.
