STATE POLICY LEVER

Using Excess Medicaid Managed Care Profits to Health Centers for Dental Workforce Development

SUCCESS FACTORS

- HCAN oversees the program steering committee, which is responsible for maintaining contracts, managing funds, and evaluating the program

THE CHALLENGE

Nebraska's federally qualified health centers experience many challenges with dental workforce recruitment and retention. In many rural and frontier Nebraska communities, FQHCs are the only provider actively accepting Medicaid patients. This results in delays in preventive care and early interventions. Medicaid patients are often left to seek care from emergency departments in lieu of more appropriate care, which leads to limited post-discharge follow-up. Because each health center's needs are unique, a solution that maximizes flexibility and facilitates innovation is essential.

STATE POLICY/STRATEGY

Nebraska Medicaid managed care organizations (MCOs) support targeted workforce development initiatives in health centers with excess profits. The Nebraska Legislature established provisions for the recoupment of excess managed care payments. This provision includes establishing the Medicaid Managed Care Excess Profit Fund where managed care organizations (MCOs) must return excess profits to the State Treasurer for additional health service needs. Prior to the calculation of excess profits, MCOs can support strategic initiatives which enhance access to care in underserved communities.

To leverage this state policy for health center staffing, Nebraska Total Care (a subsidiary of Centene) approached the Health Center Association of Nebraska (HCAN), the

state's Primary Care Association (PCA), to determine how excess managed care service delivery funds might support health centers and Nebraska's underserved communities.

STATE POLICY/STRATEGY IN ACTION

The Project Access Steering Committee (Committee) comprised of CHC Executive Leaders, MCO Funder Representatives, and non-voting HCAN staff, leads Project Access. The Committee establishes program objectives, sets measurable goals, reviews quarterly progress reports, and governs the overall vision, budgeting, and direction of the program. Funding distributions include individual health center distributions, timelines for spend down, HCAN overhead funding, and details behind the distribution formula. This formula accounts for the wide variations in health center volume. Each of Nebraska's seven health centers receive a base amount of funds annually, with additional supplemental funds allocated based on patient volume. A major strength of Project Access is the minimal administrative costs which allow the majority of funds to be used directly by Nebraska's community health centers in dental recruitment, retention, and expansion efforts.

The key areas of partnership engagement, as defined by the Project Access Steering Committee, are recruitment and retention, clinical optimization, capital improvements, and pipeline development. Sign-on bonuses, retention bonuses, wage support or incentives, loan repayment matches, and additional educational needs are all allowable under Project Access.

THE IMPACT

Since its inception in early 2022, the impact of Project Access on Nebraska Community Health Centers has exceeded expectations. In 2023, Project Access funding resulted in

the hiring of two dentists and two medical providers at rural health centers and the distribution of 315 financial incentives to staff across health centers. Additional positive outcomes, not outlined above, are available in HCAN's 2023 Project Access Impact Report. Impact reporting serves to strengthen HCAN's quantitative evaluation efforts and will serve as justification for continued funding.
