

AMERICA'S HEALTH CENTERS


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Community Health Centers are nonprofit, patient-governed organizations that provide high-quality, comprehensive primary health care to America's medically underserved communities, serving all patients regardless of income or insurance status.



Nearly 1,500 Community Health Center grantees and look-alikes provided care at 15,000 locations across the country in 2023. 1 in 10 people are health center patients, of whom:
1 8 % are uninsured
6 2 % are publicly insured
9 0 % have low-incomes
6 4 % are people of color
